

Buffalo were once the keystone of North America's grasslands, upholding thousands of natural relationships that ensured ecological and cultural prosperity. Their presence on the land met the needs of birds, wildflowers, amphibians and people alike.

In the 1800s, these vital relationships were severed by U.S. policies intended to harm and control Native peoples through the eradication of buffalo.

By 1889, only a few hundred wild buffalo remained.

Today, the loss of this amazing animal still reverberates across the land and within communities.

THE OPPORTUNITY

Each year, TNC's buffalo herds (also known as the American <u>bison</u>) produce approximately 1,500 buffalo in need of new homes. By returning these buffalo to tribal lands, we are healing and restoring a web of natural relationships that has been broken for hundreds of years.

THE SOLUTION

Indigenous Peoples are the original stewards of North America's lands and waters. They have sovereign rights and responsibilities to care for their ancestral homelands, and their conservation expertise is critical to advancing the health of our shared Earth. The InterTribal Buffalo Council (ITBC), Tanka Fund and Native Nations are leaders in buffalo restoration. Today, TNC is working in deep partnership to explore how we can restore buffalo, grasslands and communities at scale.

THE NEED

Restoring buffalo requires trust building, animals, land, infrastructure and more. The \$7M fundraising goal will support the return of, 1,500 buffalo to tribal nations across the U.S., as well the capacity and resource needs to co-create a sustainable vision for partnership in buffalo restoration.


